The Book of Psalms-

The central spiritual message of this Book of Psalms may be said to be *PRAISE THROUGH PRAYER*. Again and again, in individual psalms, we see how sighing is turned to singing through praying; while if we take the book as a whole, we see this idea moving forward ever more definitely until the whole book is wound up in the five “Hallelujah” psalms with which it closes, each of which begins and ends with the exclamation, “*Praise ye the Lord!*”

Passage for today: Psalm 19-20

Questions to Ponder

1. Psalm 19—What are the two ways this Psalm points out that God speaks to us? What is David's response to hearing from the Lord? Applications? What does this Psalm teach us about true worship? When was the last time your heart became aware of the glory and grandeur of God? Today, do you long for the Lord to cleanse you from your secret faults? Explain.
2. Psalm 20—This Psalm was written in "the day of trouble" (possibly a day of battle). Who is this song written to, written from? What is the aim of this Psalm toward its reader/hearer? How does it differ from others? What does this Psalm teach you about worship in the day of trouble? Today, is your trust, hope and worship in *the name of the Lord*? Explain.
